Outstanding pair of OTTOMAN LAMPS



This outstanding pair of oil-lamps was discovered in France during the Summer of 2010.

Made in Austria for the Ottoman-market, their most interesting features are sultan Abdulhamid IIs seal and Turkey's emblem "crescent-and-star" on both sides of the body.

We can assume that the lamps were owned by a French family having spent some years (or generations) in Turkey before they came back to France, bringing some belongings with them.



The lamps were made of spelter and were found in a slightly tarnished condition. After a week-long work of Art finish process, they came back to their original bronze imitation splendor.

Globe shades in Baccarat-crystal dating back from late 19th century were used to replace original shades that were lost.

Dimensions. Height: without glass parts 55 cm, overall height: 80 cm, shades' diameter: 20 cm.



Gustav and Ferdinand Brünner Bros. Company were identified as the manufacturers.

The lamps date back from the period 1880-1907 and were restored by

Monsieur Ara Kebapcioglu who is established in Paris as a lamp-restorer since 1981.

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
